Fulbright Iceland is thrilled to welcome you back to Iceland for this follow-up to your 2021 seminar.





Westfjords



THE WESTFJORDS

Population of the Westfjords: 7,379 (2023 estimate)

The Westfjords is a large peninsula in northwestern Iceland. The region is very mountainous, with deep fjords and steep hills. Fishing makes up a large part of the region's economy due to the close proximity of fishing areas and good natural harbors in many of the fjords. The largest town is <u>Ísafjörður</u>, sometimes called the capital of the Westfjords. The settlements are small and sparse and between them you can find dramatic landscapes and stunning sights not found in other parts of the country.

Ísafjörður is the largest town in the Westfjords. Settled in the 9th century, the town grew as a trading post for foreign merchants in the 16th century. The oldest part of the town is located on a spit of sand and contains the oldest collection of timber frame houses in Iceland, one of which is home to Tjöruhúsið restaurant.






SNÆFELLSNES

Population of Snæfellsnes: 3,961 (2023 estimate)

The <u>Snæfellsnes</u> Peninsula is a region in Western Iceland, located between Reykjavík and the Westfjords. The area is a popular destination amongst tourists and Icelanders alike. The Peninsula is known for incredibly beautiful and dramatic landscapes, where you can see all of the unique natural elements in one place: untouched lava fields, tall volcanoes, mystical glacier, black and white beaches, a National Park and hazardous cliffs along the coastline. The symbol of the area is the mysterious <u>Snæfellsjökull</u> glacier, located near the tip of the peninsula. Its mystique and majestic features have inspired many throughout the years, including French writer Jules Verne and Icelandic Nobel laureate <u>Halldór Laxness</u>.






THE CAPITAL AREA

Population of the Capital Area 247,533 (2023 estimate)



According to <u>Landnámabók</u> (the Book of Settlements written in the early 12th century), Reykjavík was the location of the first permanent settlement in Iceland. Legend has it that Ingólfur Arnarson chose the location to build his homestead around AD 870, although archaeological finds suggest settlement may have started earlier. Inspired by the steam rising from the hot springs, Ingólfur gave it the name Reykjavík ("bay of smoke").

Hafnarfjörður is the third largest municipality in the Capital region with approximately 30 thousand inhabitants. Named after its natural harbor (literal name is "harbor fjord"), the town has been a center for trade since at least the 15th century. Today, Hafnarfjörður is one of the nation's largest fishing centers.

- Participants must comply with the Iceland commission's safety, health, and housing policies and guidance during the trip.
- Participants are expected to take full part in the entire program.
- Accommodation is arranged by the Commission. Any upgrades or extras must be paid for by the participants. This includes any services, food or beverages ordered.
- Most meals are provided throughout the program. Meals are fixed menu, sometimes served family style. There will be an option available for those with dietary restrictions.
 Participants must pay for any meals or refreshments not included.
- Water is offered with all meals and sometimes soft drinks. Alcoholic beverages are seldom included.
- Participants should be prepared to do considerable walking and to spend significant time outside. There will be some light hiking and related activities but nothing overly strenuous.
- Participants must send a one-page final report by 1 September 2023 outlining their seminar takeaways and how they will use it to further develop their prior seminar project or develop a new project. The report should be sent both to the Commission and the Department of Education.


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
